in ecology without nature timothy morton argues that the chief stumbling block to environmental thinking is the image of nature itself ecological writers propose a new worldview but their very zeal to preserve the natural world leads them away from the nature they revere the problem is a symptom of the ecological catastrophe in which we are living morton sets out a seeming paradox to have a properly ecological view we must relinquish the idea of nature once and for all ecology without nature investigates our ecological assumptions in a way that is provocative and deeply engaging ranging widely in eighteenth century through contemporary philosophy culture and history he explores the value of art in imagining environmental projects for the future morton develops a fresh vocabulary for reading environmentality in artistic form as well as content and traces the contexts of ecological constructs through the history of capitalism from john clare to john cage from kierkegaard to kristeva from the lord of the rings to electronic life forms ecology without nature widens our view of ecological criticism and deepens our understanding of ecology itself instead of trying to use an idea of nature to heal what society has damaged morton sets out a radical new form of ecological criticism dark ecology

the concept of naturalness has largely disappeared from the academic discourse in general but also the particular field of environmental studies this book is about naturalness in general about why the idea of naturalness has been

abandoned in modern academic discourse why it is important to explicitly re establish some meaning for the concept and what that meaning ought to be arguing that naturalness can and should be understood in light of a dispositional ontology the book offers a point of view where the gap between instrumental and ethical perspectives can be bridged reaching a new foundation for the concept of naturalness and its viability will help raise and inform further discussions within environmental philosophy and issues occurring in the crossroads between science technology and society this topical book will be of great interest to researchers and students in environmental studies environmental philosophy science and technology studies conservation studies as well as all those generally engaged in debates about the place of man in nature

this powerful book provides the first comprehensive overview of the intellectual roots of the worldwide environmental movement from ancient religions and philosophies to modern science and ethics and synthesizes them into a new philosophy of nature in which to ground our moral values and social action it traces the origins and evolution of the dominant worldview that has built our industrial technocratic man centered civilization and brought us to the current ecological crisis at the same time it uncovers an alternative cultural tradition in the world s different religions and philosophies and describes how these ideas are now surfacing and coalescing to form an ecological sensibility and a new vision of nature which recognizes the inter relatedness of all living things finally this book integrates these varied traditions with modern physics and the science of ecology into a larger philosophical whole that provides the environmental movement with a comprehensive vision of an organic and sustainable society in harmony with nature as ecological disasters continue to threaten our planet becoming worse with every passing moment of indifference it has become clear that we must take action we must change our relationship with nature and return to the days when our lives were intimately connected to and dependent upon the natural world nature s lays the foundations for that change by explaining where our complex ideas about nature come from why they are wrong and what we can do to change them

despite widespread popular support for environmental action phillip f cramer argues that current u s environmental policy approaches fail to address the real threat of environmental insecurity cramer traces this failure to a reluctance to

early modern *Écologies* is the first collective volume to offer perspectives on the relationship between contemporary ecological thought and early modern french literature if descartes spoke of humans as being masters and possessors of nature in the seventeenth century the writers taken up in this volume arguably demonstrated a more complex and urgent understanding of the human relationship to our shared planet opening up a rich archive of literary and non literary texts produced by montaigne and his contemporaries this volume foregrounds not how ecocriticism renews our understanding of a literary corpus but rather how that corpus causes us to re think or to nuance contemporary eco theory the sparsely bilingual title an acute accent on *écologies* denotes the primary task at hand to pluralize i e de anglophone ize the environmental humanities featuring established and emerging scholars from europe and the united states early modern *Écologies* opens up new dialogues between ecotheorists such as timothy morton gilles deleuze and bruno latour and montaigne ronsard du bartas and olivier de serres

critical plant studies in taiwan presents a historical overview of vegetal ecocriticism in taiwan divided into 12 chapters it examines the human plant entanglements on the island covering a wide spectrum of topics such as the imperial plant explorations the military casuarina afforestation the mangrove conservation movement the ecofeminist rooftop garden the indigenous millet restoration the underground mycorrhizal network in urban taipei etc it discloses the phyto politics in the historical context of the vegetal materialist condition of

the island intersecting the poetics and politics of plant narratives it presents the multispecies plantscapes of the island the first of its kind the collection launches the historical and localized critical plant studies in taiwan

contemporary ideas of nature were largely shaped by schools of thought from western cultural history and philosophy until the present day concerns with environmental change and biodiversity conservation there are many different ways of conceptualising nature in epistemological terms reflecting the tensions between the polarities of humans as masters or protectors of nature and as part of or outside of nature the book shows how nature is today the focus of numerous debates calling for an approach which goes beyond the merely technical or scientific it adopts a threefold critical historical and cross disciplinary approach in order to summarise the current state of knowledge it includes contributions informed by the humanities especially history literature and philosophy and social sciences concerned with the production and circulation of knowledge about nature across disciplines and across national and cultural spaces the volume also demonstrates the ongoing reconfiguration of subject disciplines as seen in the recent emergence of new interdisciplinary approaches and the popularity of the prefix eco e g ecocriticism ecospirituality ecosophy and ecofeminism as well as subdivisions of ecology including urban ecology industrial ecology and ecosystem services each chapter provides a concise overview of its topic which will serve as a helpful introduction to students and a source of easy reference this text is also valuable reading for researchers interested in philosophy sociology anthropology geography ecology politics and all their respective environmentalist strands

new materialisms refers to a broad contemporary and significant movement of thought across the social sciences and cultural studies which attempts to re turn to renew or create alternative philosophies of matter such philosophies spring from multiple sources but are in general an attempt to bring the indissolubility of the social and environmental more forcefully into our analytical frames and modes of inquiry and tackle a perceived over reliance on discourse and language in the so called post modern era of philosophy and social science this movement in thought is underlaid by and meets up with the climate and biodiversity crises and the nature of the human condition and modes of learning or becoming within the field of environmental education this volume brings together academics working at differing intersections of environmental education and new materialisms highlighting tensions knots and lines of flight across and for research practice and theory as such this collection draws on multiple interpretations and streams of thought within new materialisms and demonstrates their significance for those engaging with environmental education policy practice and research this book was originally published as a special issue of the journal environmental education research

robert mcparland explores american music as a bridge between art audiences and the environment american melodies is a study of america s varied music genres that is grounded in interviews with folk rock and jazz musicians music listeners songwriters and organizers of music programs in local communities the author explores artists ecological social and technological concerns and the ways that music as an art form can reflect upon and actively reshape lived realities through interviews and conversations he examines how the spirit of jazz folk music and americana country and rock music brings to life relationships between people connection with their communities and expression of social and ecological concern

ecology of everyday life examines the ecological impulse as a desire for nature a desire that emerges as people within industrial capitalist contexts respond to the personal and aesthetic rather than the physical and political implications of ecological breakdown while exploring the historical causes of this romantic desire for nature heller also offers a way to reconstruct ideas of both nature and desire drawing from feminist anarchist and social ecological theory she provides an activist response to ecological questions arguing that the ecology movement too often links ecological problems to personal psychological and spiritual concerns rather than to concerns of social justice yet rather than dismiss such personal and qualitative concerns heller links the desire for a more meaningful and integral quality of life to the activist impulse itself questioning assumptions about nature desire and the ecological agenda the author encourages readers to consider new ways of desiring nature that entail changes not only in personal life

style and outlook but changes in social institutions as well. Chaia Heller holds a MA in psychology and has worked for many years as a clinical social worker counselling and advocating for women struggling with issues of domestic abuse and poverty. In addition, she has had a long career as a teacher and international lecturer in the fields of social ecology and ecofeminism and is currently on the faculty at the Institute for Social Ecology. She also teaches at the University of Massachusetts where she is pursuing a PhD.

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
